







Cebenese

Sempervivum arachnoideum

- Natural webbing of thick, white cilia covers the rosette like a cobweb and protects it in sunny, arid conditions
- One of the most prolific varieties with piles of new offsets developing into massive, mounded clumps
- Thrives outdoors in rocky crevices, squeezed into retaining walls, clustered around stepping stones, and scattered around a green roof
- Grows well in rocky soil and requires excellent drainage, particularly in winter

Zone: 5 (-20°F)

S. clavatum

Sedum clavatum

- Sweet, pastel rosette that can grow robust stems up to 8.0" long, which sprawl and spill out of pots
- Blue-green color shifts to pink with increased light and a thick coating of farina gives a matte, powdery finish
- Naturally occurring species native to the andesite cliffsides of Mexico's Tiscalatengo River
- A striking feature in hanging baskets, particularly when gently stressed by direct sun and drought

Lola

Echeveria

- Classic beauty that's been popular for decades for its pearlescent coloration and vigor
- Sun loving plant that thrives in full sun on a south facing window sill or outdoors in frost-free weather
- Powdery coating of farina protects the leaves in full sun and gives them a matte finish
- Tolerates neglect well and can easily go weeks without water

Zone: 10 (30°F)

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A Grim One

Graptoveria

- Chunky, upright leaves store lots of water and enable this plant to survive long, hot droughts
- Icy blue colors blush pink at the leaf tips when grown in full sun exposure
- Cheery yellow flowers bloom on tall bloom stalks and are speckled with tiny red dots
- Easy to propagate from mature, healthy leaves to grow your collection and share the love

Zone: 10 (30°F)

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C. obvallata Crassula obvallata

- Soft, velvety plant with fanned out leaves shaped like flat discs
- Slow grower with branching stems that can develop into low clusters
- Silvery green leaves packed with chlorophyll help this succulent tolerate indoor growing, but keep it at least somewhat close to a window
- Can bloom in spring with clusters of tiny, pale-yellow blossoms on tall bloom stalks

Zone: 10 (30°F)

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
