Ivory Towers Crassula x perforata

- · Resilient, stemmed succulent with stacks of leaves skewered on narrow stems up to 18" long
- · Pistachio green foliage has a natural, powdery coating and gets a red outline when grown in bright sun
- Forgiving plant that grows quickly in pots and has thick enough leaves to tolerate extended drought
- Easy to propagate from stem cuttings and eventually bends and sprawls from containers

String of Buttons Crassula perforata

SNJOYAS

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- Classic stemmed succulent with stacks of flat, triangular leaves skewered on slender stems
- · Green foliage can tolerate slightly lower light than brightly colored varieties; leaves have a fringe of white cilia
- Can reach a foot tall and is great for adding height to arrangements
- · Branches as it grows and can form wide, sprawling masses; propagate from stem cuttings

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Variegated Buttons Crassula perforata f. variegata

- · Variegated stemmed succulent with stacks of flat, triangular leaves skewered on slender stems
- Light green stripes and hot pink margins highlight the foliage; more sun bring out brighter pinks
- Can reach a foot tall and is great for adding height to arrangements
- Branches as it grows and can form wide, sprawling masses; propagate from stem cuttings

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Tom Thumb Crassula rupestris ssp. commutata

- · Mini stemmed succulent with lots of tiny, chunky leaves stacked up on thin, woody stems
- Wedge-shaped leaves have a pistachio green base tone and get a bright red outline when grown in bright sun
- Grows shrubby with lots of sprawling, branching stems that can fill in a pot nicely
- Drought superstar that needs welldraining soil and deep, but infrequent water

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- Rare collector's variety that slowly grows into a living optical illusion of stacked leaves
- Green, lightly felted leaves stack up so tightly they give this unique succulent a pagoda-like form
- New offsets sprout from within the main stem, leading to a clustered look
- Needs very gritty soil and very infrequent water to avoid rot; can be a fussy grower

High Voltage Crassula rupestris

- Electric highlights of fire engine red • outline its minty green, triangular leaves; give direct sun for the best colors
- Tall, narrow stems can bend out of containers, eventually reaching up to 12" long
- Clusters of tiny, white to pink blossoms emerge in spring and attract pollinators
- Roots easily from stem cuttings when planted in gritty soil and grown near a sunny window

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Crassula perforata ssp. kougaensis


- Stacked Crassula species from South Africa with minty green, triangular leaves that spiral up and blush pink at their edges in direct sun
- · Tall, narrow stems can bend out of containers, eventually reaching up to 12" long
- · Clusters of tiny, white to pink blossoms emerge in spring and attract pollinators
- · Roots easily from stem cuttings when planted in gritty soil and grown near a sunny window

Green Pagoda Crassula

- · Towering, stemmed succulent with stacks of flat, triangular leaves skewered on slender stems
- Olive green foliage can tolerate slightly lower light than brightly colored varieties
- Can reach a foot tall and is great for adding height to arrangements
- Branches as it grows and can form wide, sprawling masses; propagate from stem cuttings
